Formerly Easterbrook and Allcard, then Easterbrook, Allcard & Wild. Makers of engineers’ tools and a slightly modified/improved form of Clyburn, registered by Arnold Augustus Allcard in 1908. Their trade brand PRESTO later became the name of the company.

Thomas R. Ellin (Footprint Works) Ltd.

31–45 Hollis Croft

(at 1901)

Large maker of handtools, still thriving. Inventor and manufacturer of several styles of adjustable wrench under the ‘Footprint’ and ‘Domino’ brands, even a small Clyburn-style.

A manufacturer and inventor in the first part of the 19th Century of agricultural machines and tools. Edwin Beard Budding, his machinist, invented the lawnmower and a lasting style of adjustable wrench. He was also associated with Richard Clyburn.
